Uniformed Services (Level 2) 2024 Course Outline



Curriculum Goals:

To provide students with the opportunity to explore career pathways and develop a range of skills relevant to a future career within a range of uniformed services. These uniformed services will include exploring the roles and skills needed within the emergency services such as Police, Fire Services, Paramedic and Defence Forces. Students will have the opportunity to experience a simulated search and rescue exercise and gain essential first aid skills. They will hear first-hand what it is really like to be a paramedic, a police officer and a firefighter.

Programme Delivery:

This course is delivered in a residential block format, with four blocks in total. Each block represents one of the uniformed services curriculum areas and is four days in length. The curriculum will cover the following areas: Paramedic Services and First Aid; Fire and Rescue Services; Police Services; and Defence Forces. Students will take part in a range of practical activities and will be given the opportunity to learn through engaging in realistic and authentic tasks.

- Plan and carry out searches to locate simulated casualties within a specified area at ground level
- Move casualties to safe locations
- Plan, conduct and review an informal interview
- Communicate in the outdoors using two-way radio
- Communicate in a team or group which has an objective
- Demonstrate safe practices for participation in high ropes course activities
