

**Curriculum Goals:**

The Manaaki Tāpoi Level 2 (Introduction) course aims to celebrate the importance of cultural (indigenous) tourism. Learning will focus on key elements of the Māori culture and how they are interpreted in cultural tourism experiences. Students will gain an appreciation for the high regard that the Māori culture is held in by visiting tourists and will have opportunity to interact with these visitors.

**Programme Delivery:**

This course is delivered by Whenua Iti Outdoors in a residential block format. There are four blocks in total, each block is four days in length. Students will stay at a different marae or outdoor tourist site for each block.

During the programme, students will develop or enhance their pepeha, as well as developing an understanding of whanaungatanga and kaitiakitanga within te taiao. By the end of the programme students will be able to share their knowledge and understanding with manuhiri.

- Present a short mihi and poroporoaki in te reo Māori with local tikanga.
